Course Overview

Welcome to **Pathways to Pretrial Justice!** In this six-hour class, we'll explore the front end of the criminal legal system and how it works, including history, structure, decision points, and current controversies. We'll also discuss what antiracist reform could look like, the roles that you can play in bringing about change, and strategies for moving forward.

This course is ideal for community members, activists, and advocates hoping to influence pretrial practices and policies, and those looking for opportunities to advance equity, support people safely in the community, and close the front door to mass incarceration.

The class meets virtually via Zoom. In addition to the live session with PJI faculty, you will have access to pre-course work, reading materials and resources online.

Learning Objectives

In this class, we will:

- Articulate the goals of the pretrial process;
- Explore the history of pretrial justice through an equity lens;
- Discuss the current state of pretrial justice in America, including demographics of impacted people;
- Review the steps in the pretrial process and the decision makers involved;
- Analyze bail hearings and discuss the role of court watching;
- Examine recent advocacy efforts and current controversies in the field;
- Analyze proven and emerging practices for promoting pretrial success at each decision point; and
- Identify action steps for local advocacy.

This course is designed to meet the needs of diverse people engaged in pretrial justice, but everyone's interests and needs are different.
