

Fundamentals of Pretrial Justice: A One-Day Overview

March 2021 Course Syllabus

Course Overview

Welcome to the Fundamentals of Pretrial Justice! This five hour course will cover the legal foundations and best practices in pretrial justice through a racial equity lens. Participants will have the opportunity to reflect on their local policies and practices, discuss how the field is evolving through litigation, research, and advocacy efforts, and identify opportunities for system improvement.

This course is ideal for anyone seeking a broad understanding of pretrial justice policy and practice with the goal of contributing to safe, fair, and equitable pretrial justice systems. This includes those who play a role in pretrial system improvement, including elected officials and their staff, government and nonprofit leaders, attorneys, judicial officers and staff working in pretrial systems, and organizers and advocates at the local and national level. If you have an interest in pretrial policy or are currently engaged in local system improvement efforts or advocacy.

In addition to the five hour course, participants will have access to reading materials and resources through the University of Pretrial.

Learning Objectives

By the end of the course, you will be able to:

- Describe the legal requirements and foundational research of pretrial justice
- Analyze strategies to maximize pretrial liberty, equity, safety, and court appearance.
- Assess local pretrial system and its alignment with the law and research, including a focus on equitable practices and outcomes.

• Identify next steps for pretrial system improvement in your own work.

Course Structure and Technology

Fundamentals of Pretrial Justice is a blended learning course that combines self-guided learning activities and a live online session with the faculty. The live session will meet on Tuesday March 9, 2021 at 3 pm EST.

Some course activities will be completed on your schedule, at your own pace. Full participation in the course will require access to a computer with high-speed internet, a webcam, and either computer speakers and a microphone or a phone line.

Course materials are housed in the University of Pretrial Learning Management System.

To join the live forum from your computer or other device. If you are unfamiliar with the Zoom technology or would like to do a tech check in advance, you are welcome to login up to 30 minutes in advance.

Course Components

Each session includes the following components.

- Materials: You will be asked to spend less than an hour preparing for the class.
- The Live Forum: The live online forum with faculty will take place on March 9th from 11:00a.m.- 5:00p.m. Eastern. This session will be a fairly informal opportunity for discussion and analysis.

Course Completion Requirements

All participants enter this course with different levels of baseline knowledge and experience, and different goals for the course. As a result, we anticipate that everyone will focus their energy in different places, and will apply the content in different ways. Therefore, the course requirements focus mainly on engagement. Access the course materials;

- Complete a brief assignment before the class and engage with participants and faculty for a great learning experience.
- Complete the course evaluation.

Certificates will indicate that the participant completed a 5-hour course. The course has not been certified for continuing education credits. If any participants wish to seek
